



Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur

Rosh Hashanah, which translates in Hebrew as "Head of the Year", commonly called the Jewish New Year, occurs in September or October, and marks the birth of the world. All Jewish observances begin at sundown on the day before and end at sundown the next day. During Rosh Hashanah, God opens the Book of Life, and inscribes entries which determine the fate of mankind for the coming year. Ten days later, at the end of Yom Kippur, or the Day of Atonement, the Book of Life is sealed. These holidays are marked with prayer services, to help Jews reflect on their life and behavior during the past year, and to atone for any failings and misdeeds toward others. During the Rosh Hashanah services, the shofar, or ram's horn, is blown in a prescribed pattern of blasts, to focus one's attention. On the day of Yom Kippur, Jews are expected to fast from sundown to sundown. At the end of the Yom Kippur service the shofar is again blown, in a very long blast, to signal the end of the service. There are two customary greetings at this time. The first, on Rosh Hashanah, is L'shanah Tovah, which in Hebrew means "for a good year". The second, on Yom Kippur, is G'mar Chatimah Tovah, which in Hebrew means "may you be sealed (in the Book of Life) for good".

This year Rosh Hashanah will be celebrated on September 25 through September 27, while Yom Kippur will be from sundown October 4 through sundown October 5.

Huntcliff Project Update

We are always working on projects around our community to enhance, modify, and improve our facility. Here is a quick overview of the significant items currently being implemented and planned:

- Completed total renovation of 12 apartments
- Trees removed from some areas in the front and in the back of the building.
- A new ice machine is in the kitchen
- A new floor mixer for the kitchen is ordered and on the way.
- Pool heaters are being replaced
- The long-awaited hardscape project to refresh the walkway is coming soon! The contract has been signed and we are working on setting a date with the contractor.
- New flooring for the Dining Room, Dining Room Lobby, and Bar area will occur within the next few months.
