

Message from Lisa (Huntcliff Executive Director)

Each year, health experts analyze the flu season in the southern hemisphere - which runs from April to September - to predict what we can expect in the northern hemisphere during our flu season. While the past two flu seasons have been mild thanks to the strict infection prevention protocols in place from COVID-19, early predictions are showing this year's flu season may be worse now that restrictions are being eased. As a result, we're seeing flu cases being reported earlier than normal, making it more important than ever to get vaccinated against the flu.

It's also important to consider receiving the newly approved COVID-19 booster, which has been updated to better protect against the Omicron variant.

Our goal is to keep everyone as safe and healthy as possible. Once again, we have partnered with CVS Pharmacy to host On-Site vaccine clinics.

These clinics will occur on Tuesday, October 4th and Wednesday, October 12th. If you have signed up to receive a vaccine, the confirmation and appointment time will be placed in your cubbie. If you choose to get your vaccines at an outside location, please let Lisa or Jessica know so we can update your vaccine record.

Halloween, contraction of All Hallows' Eve, a holiday observed on October 31, the evening before All Saints' (or All Hallows') Day. Halloween had its origins in the festival of Samhain among the Celts. During the Samhain festival, the souls of those who had died were believed to return to visit their homes. Those who had died during the year were believed to journey to the otherworld. People set bonfires on hilltops to frighten away evil spirits, and they sometimes wore masks and other disguises to avoid being recognized by the ghosts thought to be present. It was in those ways that beings such as witches, hobgoblins, fairies, and demons came to be associated with the day.

As a secular holiday, Halloween has come to be associated with a number of activities. One is the practice of pulling usually harmless pranks. Celebrants wear masks and costumes for parties and for trick-or-treating, thought to have derived from the British practice of allowing the poor to beg for food, called "soul cakes." Trick-or-treaters go from house to house with the threat that they will pull a trick if they do not receive a treat, usually candy. Along with skeletons and black cats, the holiday has incorporated scary beings such as ghosts, witches, vampires and the jack-o'-lantern, a hollowed-out pumpkin, carved into a demonic face and lit with a candle inside.






New Friends

Volunteer—Rabbi Daniel Dorsch

Rabbi Daniel Dorsch is the rabbi at Temple Etz Chaim in Marietta, GA. He facilitates the community's understanding of the Torah, the Jewish Bible, in practicing Jewish values in line with the Torah's teachings. After earning his BA degrees from Columbia University and the Jewish Theological Seminary (JTS), Rabbi Dorsch received his rabbinical ordination and an MA in education from the JTS.

Following rabbinical school, he served as associate rabbi for 6 years in Livingston, NJ. In July 2016, Rabbi Dorsch assumed the position of Senior Rabbi at Etz Chaim in Marietta.

Beyond his role as rabbi at Etz Chaim, Rabbi Dorsch serves as a member of USCJ's (United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism) Teen Engagement Committee, serves as secretary of the Atlanta Rabbinical Association, and sits on the Boards of Trustees for the Jewish National Fund and the American Jewish Committee in Atlanta.

Rabbi Dorsch and his wife, an educator at the Epstein School in Atlanta, are the parents of Zev and Haley.

Sukkot (Booths) is one of three holidays during which the Israelites were required to make a pilgrimage to the Temple in Jerusalem. It lasts for eight days, and the holiday has a double significance. The first meaning is as a reminder of the temporary dwellings in which the Israelites lived during their 40-year journey after the exodus from Egypt. The second meaning marks the end of the harvest season. The farmers lived in temporary fragile dwellings in the fields while completing the ingathering of crops. The sukkah, or booth, is a small temporary walled structure roofed with palm leaves, giving an unobstructed view of the sky. Jews often erect a sukkah next to their house and they may eat their meals and sleep in the sukkah. On each day of the holiday, Jews perform a waving ceremony with four species of plants. These consist of an etrog (the fruit of a citron tree), and fronds from date palm, myrtle, and willow trees, known as a lulav.

The last day of Sukkot is Simchat Torah, which means "Rejoicing of the Torah." The Torah is paraded joyously around the sanctuary. The last portion of the book of Deuteronomy is read, and the first portion of the book of Genesis is read immediately after. This emphasizes the continuing nature of the reading of the Torah. In some synagogues, the Torah is unrolled completely, stretched around the sanctuary, and rerolled to the beginning.
