Election Day

Several elections are planned to take place in the U.S. and the state of Georgia in 2022. The general election will be held on November 8, 2022, with runoffs to be held on December 6 for those races which are not yet decided by majority vote. All of Georgia's executive officers and legislative seats, as well

as one seat on the Georgia Public Service Commission, will be up for election as well as one of Georgia's seats in the United States Senate and all of Georgia's seats in the United States House of Representatives.

There are many things that Georgians will be voting for that are not actually on the ballot. However, this election is considered by many to be one of the most important in many decades. Inflation (cost of living has increased from 2% to 8.5% in the last two years); uncontrolled illegal immigration; international crises and our involvement; abortion; crime and funding/defunding of police; and climate change; are among the major issues involved. Thanksgiving



Falling on the fourth Thursday of every November, Thanksgiving is a national holiday in the United States when friends and family come together to give thanks and recognize the sacrifices and blessings of the past year.

Thanksgiving began in 1621 when the pilgrims invited the Native Americans for a feast to share their harvest. The origin of Thanksgiving dates back to 1620 when 102 people left England and arrived in North America in search of a place to freely practice their faith. After arriving, the pilgrims were helped by local Native Americans to grow and harvest food. It's said that a Native American man named Squanto taught the Pilgrims how to catch and produce local food, which led to the first successful corn harvest.

In November 1621, both the pilgrims and Native Americans came together for a feast to enjoy the food they had grown – and this marked the first ever Thanksgiving. The alliance between the two groups soured later, which in recent years has caused debates over the traditional narrative of Thanksgiving which critics claim paint a rose-tinted picture of US history.

- The fact is that the first Thanksgiving was shared between the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag Indians in 1621.
- The celebration was more of a harvest festival with sports, games, food, dancing, singing, and revelry.
- When it comes to the food they ate, the menu wasn't much like today. Instead, it consisted of venison, fowl, and other foods prepared by the pilgrims.

On December 26, 1941, Roosevelt signed a joint resolution of Congress changing the official national Thanksgiving Day to the fourth Thursday in November starting in 1942.

Garden Club Early frost is here already. Here are several tips to keep your patio plants healthy throughout the winter. First, move your plants on the patio to a location where they receive light (preferably indirect sunlight). Second, place the plants on a saucer with gravel. Third, water them well and let them drain. Lastly, approximately every two weeks check the top two inches of the pot's soil for dryness, and water if the soil is dry. Staff Appreciation Contributions

The box shown in the photograph, located in the mail box area on the shelf below the pictures of new residents, has two uses. The use that is obvious is to submit suggestions for action by your residents association. The use that is not so obvious is as a receptacle for contributions to the employee appreciation fund. You're probably aware that there is a very strict rule in Huntcliff Summit that residents are not allowed to tip. In lieu of

tipping, the association established a way to show our appreciation to team members of their hard work on our behalf all year long. Residents can make their contributions weekly, monthly, or once per year. The earlier you make your contribution, the easier it is for your residents association officers to do the necessary staff monetary determinations. The final deadline for the contribution to be used this year is December 8. Contributions can be made by cash or check. If you choose to pay by check, the check should be made out to "Huntcliff Summit Residents Association," or its abbreviation "HSRA". We do not have the ability to accept payments by credit card. The suggested contribution is \$1.00 per person per day. Our annual goal is for all residents to donate at least the suggested amount, which is \$70,000 this year. At this writing, donations are \$24,188.50, which is 35% of the goal. You might be interested in some of the comments team members have made in previous years:

I donate this money to my relatives back home, and it makes a tremendous difference in their lives.
