In Islam, Ramadan is a time for reflection, contemplation, and celebration. The Ramadan start date for 2023 is expected to begin on Wednesday 22 March, following the sighting of the moon over Mecca. Lasting for 30 days, Ramadan will end on Friday 21 April, with the celebratory days of Eid al-Fitr starting on Saturday 22 April or Sunday 23 April.

Fasting is a key part of Ramadan, and all those of able body and sound mind should fast during this Holy time. It is traditional to break the fast by eating dates, a proven healthy snack, before the evening meal. Eid al-Fitr, meaning 'Festival of Breaking the Fast', is the important holiday that follows the month of Ramadan. Celebrated for up to three days, Eid al-Fitr does not begin until the sighting of the moon, although it is expected to start on Saturday 22 April or Sunday 23 April 2023. It is a time for great feasts, the giving of gifts to children and spending time with those dearest to you.

Many of our Huntcliff neighbors are newcomers to Atlanta so the Harbinger will be adding interesting tid-bits about Atlanta's culture, history, entertainment, and life-style.

Did you know that Atlanta is the highest major city east of the Mississippi? Located at the southern tip of the Appalachians, the altitude of 1080 feet is one reason for the cool evenings in spite of the warm (and even hot) summer days.

# Ramadan 2023

### **Did You Know?**

### **Purim**

Purim is a Jewish holiday which occurs exactly one month before Passover. The story is told in the Bible in the Book of Esther (in Hebrew Megillah). In the fifth century BCE, King Ahashuerus of Persia married a new gueen: Esther, the cousin of Mordechai. Haman, the king's royal advisor, created a plot to kill all

the Jews in Persia because Mordechai would not bow down to him. He held lotteries (in Hebrew Purim) to determine the date to do this. Queen Esther found out about Haman's plot, and asked the king to hold a banquet to which Haman and Mordechai were invited. Mordechai had previously discovered a plan to assassinate the king, and, in his gratitude, the king wanted to reward him. Esther told the king of Haman's plot to kill the Jews, which included herself. Ahashuerus cancelled Haman's plot, hung Haman instead, and the Jews were saved.

The holiday is observed by reading the Book of Esther in the synagogue, while congregants wear costumes and dance. During the reading, when the name of Haman is read in the text, noisemakers are sounded to drown out his name. It is customary for many to give gifts of food, drink, or money to the poor at Purim, and a special three-sided pastry with filling, called *hamantaschen*, which represents Haman's hat, is eaten.

### **Easter and the Lenten Season**

As an important religious observance in the Christian world, Lent is the season to observe and commemorate the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the son of God, our Savior and Redeemer. It is an opportune time to reflect on what it means to be a follower of Christ. Lent is the season of the church year that follows the Epiphany Season. It is a time we set aside each

year to remember the love of God that is poured out through Christ Jesus on the cross in His death, and His defeat of death, sin and Satan. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days. Lent is marked by fasting, both from food and festivities. Lent is predominately observed by Catholics (and the Orthodox, albeit on a slightly different calendar), but Christians of all denominations can and do participate. About a guarter of Americans observe Lent.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. You may have noticed people with a smudged, black cross on their foreheads. Those are ashes from the Ash Wednesday service. The ashes symbolize our grief for the things we've done wrong and the resulting division of imperfect people from a perfect God.

Holy Thursday is the day before Good Friday. It commemorates the night before Jesus died, when He shared the Passover meal with His closest friends and followers. Christians refer to this meal as the Last Supper. It was at this meal Jesus consecrated bread and wine into His Body and Blood. He commanded the Apostles to "Do this in Remembrance of Me".

Good Friday is the day Christians remember Jesus' death. The "Good" reflects how Jesus' death was a sacrifice on our behalf so we can receive God's forgiveness for our sins.

Easter Sunday is the joyful celebration of Jesus rising from the dead to give us the opportunity of eternal life. While people still die, Jesus made the way for people to have a relationship with God in this life and to spend eternity with Him in heaven.

Joan was born and raised in Kingsport, Tennessee but her family moved to Massachusetts and Long Island. In Bayside, Long Island, Joan completed her high school education and began to work for Met Life in NYC as a bookkeeper. She and her husband travelled together to work at Met Life. After getting married, Joan wanted to buy some artwork for a large empty wall they had in their house. Her husband wanted to spend the money on more practical items, so Joan painted her first painting that is still proudly hanging in her Huntcliff apartment.

Joan moved to Atlanta about 30 years ago. A minister at her church asked for volunteers to make some doll house furniture. Without any formal training, Joan volunteered to make the furniture. The furniture turned out to be fantastic and she took several samples to a doll house store in Buckhead. The owner of the store fell in love with her work and proudly displayed it at shows and exhibitions throughout the United States. Joan became so busy with the orders that she had to hire other people to help her with the work.

Joan moved to Huntcliff about 5 years ago. At Huntcliff Joan continues to make artful things. She began in the knitting club and made scarves for Ukraine, adult hats for cancer patients at Northside Hospital, and over 100 hats annually for patients at Childrens' Hospital.

The Huntcliff Mens' Club was reorganized in August of last year. The previous group had basically been a ROMEO (Retired Old Men Eating Out) organization, but it was decided that we wanted all men to be able to participate so we went in a different direction.

The club enrolls all men who are living at Huntcliff automatically upon their move-in and currently has 49 members. It is designed so that all the men can participate to their comfort level. We have approximately four speakers in house per year, four trips to various plants and facilities in the Atlanta area and four lunches out for discussions.

Since August, we have had the Mayor of Sandy Springs and a Senior Tax attorney come speak to us, we have visited the museum at Lockheed Marietta where we toured all the planes that have been produced there since WW2, the Computer Museum of America and had lunches at Vintage Pizzeria and the Sandy Springs Diner. We have currently scheduled a tour of the Kia Auto plant, the Federal Reserve Bank, and the Georgia Public Safety Training Center in Forsyth where we will be the Jury in a Mock Trial.

Baseball's origin goes back some 240 years. While rules have changed continuously, this year there are dramatic changes designed mostly to accelerate the average game time, which has become more than 3 hours, and to increase the offense. Basic rule changes are:

Pitch timing limit: Pitchers will have a time limit wherein they must make a pitch and batters will have a time limit wherein they must be in the batter's box. No more "dawdling". Shift restrictions: No more moving the third baseman into the outfield; there must be 4 players in the infield with two players being on each side of 2<sup>nd</sup> base. Bigger bases: expanded from 15"-18" to reduce collisions and increase stolen bases. "Ghost runner": Games tied after 9 innings will have an automatic runner placed on 2<sup>nd</sup> base beginning in the 10<sup>th</sup> and each subsequent inning. This was originally used during the pandemic.

All these changes were tested in minor league play this past season and found to be productive. Game time was reduced over 10% and offense and stolen bases were improved. "Take me out to the ball game" will be faster and better!
