Did you know that Huntcliff has a fully equipped wood shop for resident's use? It is on the South B level garage, tucked away in the dark corner. It is equipped with most bench tools; drill press, grinder, band saw, jig saw, and belt sander. There is a contractor saw for bigger projects. There is also a make shift paint booth for minor spray paint touch ups. There are

some supplies of nails and screws, glues, clamps, scrap lumber, paints, and solvents. The availability of hand tools is currently limited. The key is available to residents, only with the approval of the activities director, at the front desk. Safety glasses are available and MUST be used any time you are working with a motorized tool.
