A History of Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day, also known as St. Valentine's Day, is observed on February 14 each year; however, its celebration is very different from its origins. The holiday's roots derive from a Christian feast day honoring saints named Valentine for their martyrdom. The full history of St. Valentine's Day is yet obscure, but legends abound. One of the most popular legends tells of Valentine, a priest in 3rd century Rome, who defied Emperor Claudius II after the ruler had outlawed marriage for young men, thinking that young single men made better soldiers. The priest was put to death on February 14, 269 A.D., thus establishing the date for Valentine's Day. Another Valentine, the bishop known as St. Valentine of Terni, was beheaded by the emperor one year later, on the same date. There are many other legends about St Valentine, including the story of an imprisoned saint sending the first "Valentine greeting", after falling in love with a young girl who often visited him before his execution. He wrote a letter to her signed: "Your Valentine."

Valentine's Day was not celebrated as a day of love and romance until the Middle Ages, when it was believed the date marked the beginning of the birds' mating season ("lovebirds" of early spring). The exchange of gift cards, candy, flowers, etc. became commonplace around the 18th century. Printing technology advanced in the 1900s and printed cards became the norm. Hallmark introduced greeting cards in 1912 and the first official "Valentine's Day" card in 1916.

In spite of the less than romantic origins of Valentine's Day, it has become a significant cultural and commercial celebration of love.



Special Days in February

Presidents' Day

Is a holiday in the United States celebrated on the third Monday of February. It is often celebrated to honor all those who served as presidents of the United States and, since 1879, has been the federal holiday honoring Founding Father George Washington, who led the Continental Army to victory in the American Revolutionary War, presided at the Constitutional Convention of 1787, and was the first U.S. president.

George Washington

(February 22, 1732 – December 14, 1799) was an American Founding Father, military officer, politician and statesman who served as the first president of the United States from 1789 to 1797. Appointed by the Second Continental Congress as commander of the Continental Army in June 1775, Washington led Patriot forces to victory in the American Revolutionary War and then served as president of the Constitutional Convention in 1787, which drafted and ratified the Constitution of the United States and established the American federal government. Washington has thus been called the "Father of the Nation".

Abraham Lincoln

(February 12, 1809 – April 15, 1865) was an American lawyer, politician, and statesman who served as the 16th president of the United States from 1861 until his assassination in 1865. Lincoln led the United States through the American Civil War, defending the nation as a constitutional union, defeating the insurgent Confederacy, abolishing slavery, expanding the power of the federal government, and modernizing the U.S. economy.
