Message from Lisa Schilling—Huntcliff Executive Director

It's hard to believe we are already half-way through 2024! Since the beginning of the year, I am pleased to say we have added 16 new team members to our Huntcliff Summit family. In the past few years since the pandemic, filling positions has been a challenge. We are finally to the point where almost all positions have been hired! As these new team members come on board, they begin with several hours of on-line computer training and we have reintroduced in-person Sunrise Fundamentals training. This is a course I facilitate which gives me a great opportunity to spend 2 days focused on getting to know them and setting up for success. During this time, they learn the history of Sunrise, our Mission, our Principles of Service, Core Values, and our Team Member Credo. After this training, they are paired with a tenured team member to learn the specific tasks of their position. Each of you also play a key role in their on-boarding process as well. Please do not hesitate to provide guidance and feedback to any of our newest team members. I know they come here each day with a passion to serve. It's my hope they each find Huntcliff to be the special place that those of us who have been around for 20+ years know it to be!

Response To a Resident Question

Resident Question - What were the results of the City's inspection of our facility and specifically the balconies?

On April 19th a Sandy Springs Code Compliance officer stopped in for a routine walk of the property. During this visit, the Code Compliance Officer noted that some balconies required attention. Translation = some of the balconies had small layers of concrete that had chipped away. We then engaged a structural engineer to inspect for any structural issues and none were found. It was determined that any work that needed to be completed was purely cosmetic. More details will come once we have developed a plan to address this issue. We remain in contact with the Sandy Springs Compliance to keep them up to date on our efforts.

July 4th - Independence Day

The first celebration of July 4 occurred in 1777. However, Independence Day had not become an official holiday until 1870 when Congress made it an unpaid holiday for federal employees. In 1938, it was changed to a paid federal holiday. Independence Day is commonly associated with fireworks, parades, barbecues, carnivals, fairs, picnics, concerts, baseball games, family reunions, political speeches, and ceremonies, in addition to various other public and private events celebrating the history, government, and traditions of the United States. Independence Day is the national day of the United States.
