June Holidays

D-Day (June 6)—June 6, 1944 was the day that over 150,000 Allied troops executed the largest amphibious landing invasion in history, storming the beaches of Normandy, France, to liberate Europe from Nazi Germany control. This marked the beginning of the end of World War II, with the Allies eventually defeating Germany in 1945.

Flag Day (June 14)—Celebrated annually to commemorate the adoption of the American flag by the Continental Congress on that date in 1777. It is a day to celebrate the history, symbolism, and meaning of the **Stars and Stripes**, a symbol of freedom and national unity.

Father's Day (June 15)—Father's Day was first celebrated in 1910, but it was not until 1972 that President Nixon signed a proclamation making Father's Day a federal holiday. The day is observed each year on the third Sunday in June.

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June Holidays (continued)

Juneteenth (June 19)—President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, which declared the slaves in the Confederate states to be free. However, it was not until two and a half years later, on June 19, 1865, that some 200,000 slaves in the Galveston, Texas, area learned that slavery had been declared illegal; they were free. Celebrating June 19 became an annual tradition and gradually spread across the country as states observe the date as the ending of slavery in the United States. On June 15, 2021, the United States senate approved the bill that makes Juneteenth a legal public holiday. President Biden signed the bill on June 17, 2021.

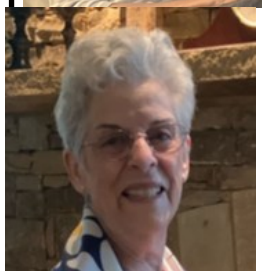
It's nice to return to writing articles for The Harbinger! Thanks to all involved for bringing this wonderful newsletter back into circulation!
